NATIONAL PRESIDENT – TERRY COOPER

Mark needs to talk us through the accounts for 2015 and his Budget for 2017. Which needs to include any additional expenditure we require on major items for whatever purpose.

We need to look at the support we receive from Marchesi House as our administration contract with them ends at the end of this year. We will be focussing on this at the Board Meeting in January so should have a recommendation for you to discuss at the Council Meeting.

I would like to briefly discuss the AGM and a change of format, if we can achieve it, to shorten the meeting to finish at lunch time at the latest. Much of this depends on the number of Resolutions and Elections of course.

We need to discuss the retiring National Councillors and what replacements we have in the pipeline as there are quite a few changes this year. I'm sure we all want to see as many Regions as possible with motivated and enthusiastic Councillors come April.

Strategic Plan

Millennium Way and Arboretum

These still seem to be partly under my wing, which is fine. I understand from Mark that there is a small budget for the Arboretum and there is a bit of work needed to keep it in good shape. The Millennium Way has no budget. They desperately need a budget mostly to help market and publicise it to the walking fraternity. They have so far developed a pretty good website, they have done an incredible amount of work to set up a 100 mile trail with 44 circular walks and have got a team of nearly 50 41 Clubbers from about 12 clubs who act as Committee, Super Wardens and Wardens. In addition to this they have persuaded the Ordnance Survey to carry the route which is no mean feat. The website gets about 3500 hits per month and this is rising. In 2015 they even opened a Disabled Ramblers Circular Walk. Please can we consider giving them a budget for proposals that will be available in mid-January.

Vice President

Everything seems to be progressing nicely, with more club visits recently, but I know this is the calm time before the April storms! My transport and diary people are working well now. I have got some sponsorship which is lovely, but have not yet managed to get a car. My charity will be Shelter and my main fundraising event will be a cycle, with my good friend Colin Bowater, from, John O'Groats to Land's End (JOGLE). The venue will hold up to 150 and the Lichfield clubs are keen to expand the numbers attending. More publicity is required this year.

"41 Club in the Community" Recommendation

Background

It was agreed at the June 2015 National Council meeting that I should investigate and present proposals for 41 Clubs in their communities for rolling out over the next 2 years.





At the October Council meeting I presented a report giving brief details of the approach under 3 headings.

- To promote active involvement in the community to improve opportunities to recruit new and younger members to clubs from Round Tables and give a purpose for those who haven't joined and may still be hanging on in Round Table.
- To promote Round Table by using the Round Table family name in communication about activities in 41 club. This will in turn help to improve membership of Round Table in a community and ultimately 41 Club.
- Targeted Community work. Looking at potential re-starts of Round Tables where there are existing 41 Clubs. Targeting 41 Clubs on doing something in the community to raise awareness of their association in the Round Table family will firstly assist Round Table but could be a catalyst for an instant connection with any new Table formed.

Recommendation

1. Working with Round Table.

Round Table have done a tremendous amount of work using paid for demographic information on the best and most likely chances of re-opening a Round Table in a Community, very specifically where there is a current 41 Club. Using the results of that work they have created a ranking list to achieve some major objectives. I have a copy of the full report which can be made available on request but is not included in this recommendation for brevity but includes the following outputs.

Principles

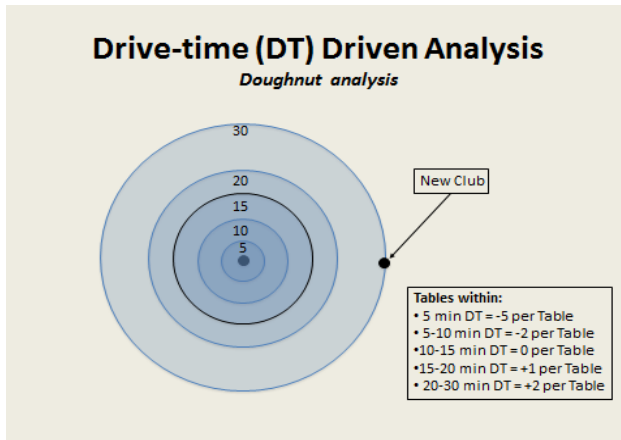
Demographics and doughnuts!

- Club catchment area = 15 minutes drive-time
- Using "ripple effect" for operational efficiency
- Proximity to "solus" 41 Clubs *(41 Clubs without feeder Tables)*
- Proximity to existing Tables *(with minimal catchment overlap)*
 - Multi-radii analysis (doughnut)
- Target age male population density
- Recently closed Tables *(over the past 3 years)*
- Output – Ranked Target Town List
 - Tranche 1 – 25 towns
 - Tranche 2 – 25 towns
 - Tranche 3 – 25 towns

Hot Spot Analysis

Finding the biggest opportunities

- Where to target new Tables?
- Biggest opportunities first:
 - Awareness of Round Table
 - Proximity to existing Clubs
 - Proximity to solus 41 Clubs
 - Density of target male population
- Ranked Target Town List



The key objective of the reports will form the basis of the Round Table push to open new Round Tables in the coming 2 years. You will see that 41 Clubs are involved in the thinking which tries to ensure that the approach is not ad-hoc but aims to fill in geographic gaps without creating overlaps in catchment areas.

Our recent survey gave a strong steer that one of the things we should be concentrating on is to support the growth of Round Table.

Attached to this report is a spreadsheet showing the top 75 target Towns. From that I have extracted information to create a first target list for 41 Clubs with the top 2 target Towns in each region. Some regions don't have targets in the top 75 but I have extracted other information from the full list to create equality for each Region.

The recommendation is to talk to each of the nominated 41 Clubs to seek their support to Round Table in attempting to re-open a local Round Table. A very simple community event i.e. a quiz or something easy should be organised to link the local 41 Club to Round Table and the Round Table family working in the community with a reminder that there used to be a Round Table in the town or alternatively just a local press release. I have received information from Round Table in my current attempt to re-open Bishop's Stortford Round Table in terms of the support available, the process and many hints and tips plus the support of the Regional Rep. Should this recommendation be approved I will put together a set of guidelines on how to do this.

The Benefit

Shows to both our members and Round Table that we are working together to support them. The knock on will be a closer link with Round Table locally and potential encouragement through local publicity for members who have left Table but not joined 41 Club to join.

2. Promoting our own Community Resources

41 Club has two major resources that show that we are working in our communities. They are the Millennium Way Walk and the 41 Club Garden in the National Arboretum. These are very successful in their own right but to show 41 club in the community they need to be promoted more heavily.



PR and Communication is required to support and develop. My recommendation is that this should be done recognising 41 Club as part of the Round Table family. See budget below.

3. Identifying and supporting existing Community activities.

We know that there are a number of clubs that already engage independently in Community activities. These need to be identified and publicised both internally in our newsletter and web site but wherever possible externally in the community. Until we get a momentum this will involve Regional Councillors help in identifying what is happening on the ground and most importantly reporting it. We should then, via the internal mechanisms encourage other clubs to firstly tell us what they are doing and secondly encourage others to do so.

Once again we should always report externally on the basis of 41 Club as a member of the Round Table family.

PR and Communication

The web site must be utilised to report progress on all our Community activities and a separate section should be created on the front page for feed. I have also received good support from Nicole at Round Table with press releases particularly where there is a perceived benefit to Round Table. A generic press report can easily be created.

Budget

There are two elements to budgetary cost. The first is support to the new Round Table element and the second to the promotion of Community Resources.

New Round Tables: There is a small cost to clubs for the first and second meetings of a potential new Table. Those really are the buying of drinks for prospective's who attend as a starter. Most clubs or members will be happy to cover those costs themselves either as individuals or from the club. I believe though we should make available £150 for each club who holds new Round Table members evenings and gets to the stage of submitting an "Expression of Interest in Opening a New Round Table" form to Marchesi House

Realistic maximum cost £1,500 in 2016 and £1,500 in 2017. Whilst we might have already paid Round Table under our agreement for 2016 I believe we should reduce the amount we donate in 2017 by £3,000 assuming we are effectively spending the money on promoting Round Table.

Promotion of Millennium Way and Arboretum. I believe we should set aside £1,500 in 2016 and £1,500 in 2017.

Conclusion

The feedback we have always had from those who never joined 41 Club is that we don't do anything and that we are dining clubs. We also know that most clubs don't want to change even if we can prove that by getting involved in the community is beneficial to them. This report identifies ways in which we can give a genuine support to Round Table, promotion of events





that are happening and encouragement to do something. There is nothing in this report that could be construed as trying to compel clubs to do things against their will.

I recommend it to you and will be happy to discuss at the Council meeting.

Resolutions

Resolution 1

The National Council Proposes:

Free National Capitation of 41 Club for Round Tablers or Ex-Round Tablers in the 40-45 age bracket with effect from 1st January 2017

Rationale:

Arising from the Strategic Plan this resolution is to provide a seamless and cost effective transition from Round Table into 41 Club. This will contribute to the slowdown of the current trend of declining membership. Round Tablers will have up to 5 years to meet, greet, get to know and enjoy the fellowship of their future Club members. It will help clear the Mystic of us and them and reinforces the Round Table Family concept. This resolution will help to improve the conversion rate of leavers from Round Table to members of 41 Club

Rule Changes: Rule 4

Amend rule 4.1 by adding :

save that no capitation fee shall be payable for any member until the financial year in which he attains the age of 46 years

Resolution 2

The National Council proposes:

That the title of the 'Association's International Officer is Changed to 'International Relations Officer' (National IRO).

Rationale:

This title change will bring our Association into line with all other 'National Associations' under the 41 International umbrella.

Rule Changes: Rule 6.1, 15.1 and appendices

Resolution 3

The National Council proposes:

That all members of the National Council (with the exception of the National President, National Vice-President and the Immediate Past National President) shall be elected for a three year term at the Annual General Meeting and that the service in that office is limited to that initial three year term.

Rule Changes: Rule 6.2, 9.3.1

Rationale:

National Council needs to regenerate itself and introduce new blood on a regular basis. It is believed that the present five years allowed in post (an initial 3 year term followed by a second term of 2 years) is too long. It is believed that the shorter overall term will encourage more members to take on these roles. It will help disperse the myth that Officers are in post for long periods, distracting members from putting forward their nominations.

Resolution 4

The National Council proposes:

Should any member of the National Council not perform satisfactorily in his duties, or any member of the Association be found guilty of a serious criminal offence, then they shall be subject to the Association's Disciplinary Policy.

Rationale:

This resolution has arisen out of the Governance Review and past incidences within the wider membership. There is no robust policy or guidelines in place to ensure uniformity and consistency in approach. This is an enabling clause within Rule 10.8 that allows the drafting of a policy and its annual review by National Council to ensure it is fit for purpose.

Rule Change: Rule 10.8

Resolution 5

Tredegar 41 Club proposes:

Current Rule 20.7 replaced as below:

20.7 The National Board and Council shall manage the Association's affairs within the budget agreed at each AGM for the financial year following. The National Treasurer shall report to the membership ahead of each Council Meeting, the progress made against the budget. Any additional expenditure, not presented to an AGM or contained within the budget shall not





be authorised without prior approval of the membership at a General Meeting. In the event of an emergency, National Council may approve additional expenditure up to an amount not greater than 1% of the overall budget during the financial year with the membership being informed through the email system.

Rationale:

In the financial year ending 31st December 2014, expenditure was authorised by National Council that was not presented to the membership for their approval and resulted in the reserves being depleted by forty thousand pounds.

The current rule 20.7 was used to extricate National Council from the possibility of the authorisation process being proved invalid thereby rendering National Council open to the possibility of replacing the Association funds themselves.

Current rule 20.7 is ambiguous and could be challenged legally if an instance of this nature should arise again. New rule 20.7 gives clarity regarding what authority is bestowed on the National Board and National Council by the membership.

Resolution 6

A new rule 20.9

20.9 The Association's reserves shall be maintained at a level agreed at a General Meeting of the Association.

New rule 20.9 ensures that reserves are maintained at a level agreed by the membership.

NATIONAL TREASURER – MARK FAIRCHILD

2015 Accounts

With the New Year barely twelve years old, I've produced the first draft of the accounts for 2015. There are still a few things to finalise, but assuming there are no nasty surprises amongst them

I've listed below the details for budget heads whose outturn varies by more than 10% and £1k, or where the figure is awaiting confirmation. I haven't attached the I&E yet as I don't want to have lots of different versions floating around confusing people.

Income

Capitation fees are down by £17k. Marchesi House may have some more to pay in, I will find out on Monday.

Sales profit cannot be calculated until I have the stock return from Barry, which we are hoping to sort out early next week. For now I have assumed it will come in on budget.

Advertising income was zero again, this budget is removed in 2016.

Expenditure

IT Systems – the I & E shows a large underspend of £7,232, however we actually spent slightly more (£18) than the budget in total on IT. In keeping with previous years, spend on IT development of £7,250 was capitalised. Note that most of the development spend was in the first 3 months of the year, prior to the Harrogate AGM. Since then, National Council have approved some small items of expenditure to ensure that the links between CAS and the Website can be properly maintained. These total £2,416.

AGM budget was overspent by nearly £2k. I think the time has come to look at holding them in a less prestigious venue. £9k spent with an attendance of perhaps 300 people, that's £300 per delegate,

Presidents expenses overall (home, overseas and car) are under by £2,374. Normally the car would be funded from the reserve set up a few years ago, however there has been no need to this year.





International Officers expenses are under by £1k. Following the budget review in the summer Dave has curtailed his plans to reduce his spend.

41 International subscriptions have not yet been invoiced, despite a couple of reminders to the International Treasurer. I have assumed it will come in on budget.

The International HYM produced a surplus of just over £1,500. This excludes the agreed contribution from National of £2,700, which has not been used, so a good result all round.

The final cost to the association of the 70th Anniversary was £4,377. We had agreed a contribution from National of £1k, so the net loss was £3,377. The shortfall was due to the low take-up by members or the over-optimistic expectations of the organisers, depending on which stance you take. Either way, we can't change the past, I'm sure any future anniversary events will be mindful of the lessons learned.

Magazine printing is underspent by just over £4k. With more members opting for online rather than a physical magazine, the postage costs are dropping.

Council Meeting costs are underspent by nearly £5k. Two meetings in Birmingham (February and September) have helped to reduce travel costs for councillors.

Board meeting costs are down nearly 50%, despite having an extra, albeit virtual, meeting this year. Better use of this technology should mean we could save most of this budget.

Club visits by Councillors shows a similar saving. This either means that councillors aren't making the visits or they aren't claiming for them when they do. I suspect it is a combination of the two. *Note that I haven't made a provision for Phil's expenses which are going to be discussed at the Council Meeting.*

Insurance costs shows a small underspend this year of just under £1k

Gifts & Awards budget is less than 50% spent. I think this is due to most of the Harrogate conference team foregoing their medals, but need to confirm this with Colin.

Depreciation is double the budgeted figure, although we have known this will be the case since the start of the year, due to the capitalisation of the 2015 IT Development.

So the overall position is showing a £3k surplus on the year, against a budgeted £3k deficit.

I will prepare a cash-flow statement next week and circulate them with the draft accounts once the remaining queries have been resolved.

2017 Budget

Notes for the draft budget are as follows:





General Secretary – I have assumed Marchesi House retain the contract when it comes up for renewal. Any alternative will be cheaper we are told, which would give additional savings.

IT Systems – assumes we don't change, i.e. still use Office 365, Techno's, Toucan, AuthSMTP etc. We should be able to make savings on the Techno's spend if we hold our own copy of the old website archive. £5k allowed in the budget for "fixes". Have assumed no CAS2 project, although this would affect the depreciation budget as it would be capitalised.

AGM cost – maintained at 2016 level

President's expenses – home includes car & insurance.

Presidents overseas – includes VP attendance at HYM

International officer expenses – reduced by £1k. This is to keep within the 10% rule for international spend. Could come off President's overseas expenses instead.

41 International capitation – increase again due to fee structure revision.

Cost of conference – maintained at 2016 level

Magazine – assume £13k per issue including postage. Any postal inflation will be offset by decline in physical copies.

Honoraria budget removed. If you don't get free minutes, put a claim in for your calls (you will need itemised billing). If you are posting stuff, put a claim in with receipts, or better still email it.

Depreciation – this is based on current assets, and assumes no development in 2016 (there is none budgeted) and a joint membership database with Round Table in 2017.

Membership promotion does not include the £5k Platinum RTBI membership. The agreement comes to an end in 2016. The monies will then be split between a budget for Community Service of £3,000 and expenditure on the Millennium Way of £1,500.

Capitation Fee has to remain at £14.50. If we take a very pessimistic view of membership numbers at 15,000 then that will produce an income of £217,500.

NATIONAL MEMBERSHIP – DUNCAN KENNEDY

1. Round Table Data Project

At the beginning of 2015 we had already had the historic agreement with Round Table to enable us (with certain provisos) the ability to access Round Table's historic database.

A cleansing exercise was carried out by some members of the Board and the Councillors for each Region. An email was then sent by Round Table to all those with email addresses on the database asking them if they would want to opt out of being contacted by 41 Club. When the web site became live we sent an email from 41 Club to all of these people.

From that I received a number of enquiries which were all dealt with. The lists were then passed on to the Councillors at their request to liaise with the Clubs at local level.

This is not a quick fix as it will take time for Councillors/Clubs to make contact with all these people and I have always believed that this would be a 3 year project. One year down two to go!

It is very difficult to monitor exactly who has joined as a result of this exercise due to the fact that the Clubs need to include them on the database and advise the Councillors accordingly. This, I am afraid is the only way it can be done whilst we are an association of clubs rather than of members.

I set out below a report on the position as at 31st December.

The headings below are:

- All Prospects** - All those that were on the RT database
- Imported** - Those not allocated elsewhere. This is the section that Councillors need to work on and to move people to other sections when enquiries completed.
- Proposed/Marked Duplicate** - Those that are already members of 41 Club
- Rejected Invite** - Those who have said they do not want to join or where clearly they will not e.g. under the age of 40
- Invited Not Confirmed** - Really speaks for itself
- Pending Member** - Again this rather speaks for itself.
- Accepted & Joined** - As does this

I must point out the one anomaly and that is Region 23. For some reason RT put all their non Tabler contacts in RT Area 1 and they then fell into Region 23. I have moved all of those to Rejected Invite. The total of these was about 2,900. Therefore, if you take that figure out of the equation we had 6,389 prospects. At the moment we have 43 likely to join or who have joined.

I need to draw your attention to the Rejected Invite column. As I have mentioned above I placed 2,900 in there from Region 23. I have also placed in this section all those under 40 who had not already been put in there. On further analysis of that section it shows 104 people who are over 40 and who do not wish to join.

Assuming that all Councillors have removed all duplicates it means that we have 4,964 people left to contact who may be prospects. If we look at those that have been contacted and are potential members, by my calculations that is the 104 who have said they do not wish to join and the 43 that could be or are a member. Therefore, out of 147 potential members 29% are or are likely to be a member. If we follow through that percentage to those left to contact this would result in a further 1,400 members. It is quite possible, however, that the Imported section still shows those who have been contacted but for some reason they have not been moved to another section.

Following agreement from National Council I have been able to recruit some volunteers from various Clubs to assist with making telephone contact with some of these prospects and that is ongoing.

2. Tables without a 41 Club

Last year I produced a list of all those Tables that do not have an affiliated 41 Club. These were split between members of my committee to try to make contact with the Table to try to see if we could form a new 41 Club. This identified a number of targets for potential new Clubs. As I mentioned last year there are a large number of unaffiliated clubs out there that consist of all past Tablers. My committee and other Councillors have worked hard to identify potential new Clubs and the list to 31st December appears below/overleaf.

3. Membership Details

Figures are always given at an AGM for the current number of members and how that change differs from previous years. This year is no different and I set out below a table showing the membership numbers by Regions over the last few years together with the percentage change between January 2015 and January 2016. As you can see there has been a 1.0% reduction and this is half what it has been over the last few years. Despite it being a reduction this is quite positive news.

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4. Tablers reaching 45

The Date Project mentioned above gives us a one off opportunity to attract more members to the Association over the next 2 years. After that we will be reliant on those leaving Round Table to come in to replace those that have left for whatever reason. Part of the agreement with Round Table was to ensure that 41 Club receive details of those Tablers who have reached the age of 45 prior to the AGM. I am currently working with Round Table on a project to recruit those Tablers who have reached 45 and who are now ready to graduate to 41 Club. This will see a graduation ceremony (rather than a leaving do) and will involve the local 41 Club (or even a couple of neighbouring Clubs) attending at the Tabler's last Table meeting to encourage him to graduate to 41 Club. This is an ongoing process and we hope to roll out some more details prior to the AGM.

I make no apology for repeating the statement I made last year as it still holds well. Although almost everything I have said above relates to membership of 41 Club we must not lose sight of our obligation to support Round Table and to help it grow. This is where our members have to come from and without a strong Round Table organisation we will eventually see our numbers reduce completely. Now, this is unlikely to happen for quite a number of years but surely we should be doing something now. Gentlemen as you go through your daily life please be on the lookout for potential Tablers (and Circlers). If we can all over a period of time introduce just one Tabler each into the organisation we will not only be instrumental in helping to secure the future of Round Table but also of 41 Club.

The Spring 2016 edition will be my fifteenth and last edition. The magazine has changed considerably during my editorship reducing the photos of national officers, gongs and men in penguin suits. I have strived to introduce more articles of interest to members rather than just about them. Apart from the National President there are no reports from National or Regional Officers, with most of the input coming from you the members. We no longer feature items like the small ads as technology has made them redundant and the book of remembrance will be moving exclusively to the club website after the next edition.

Each edition of the magazine has been a consistent 32 pages and by reducing the weight of the paper used we have managed to keep the postal cost to a lower rate. Over the five years there have been numerous postal price increases, the imposition of VAT on postage and other cost increases. However we have managed (with the help of several people) to keep the cost of each magazine to just 89p per copy per member including packaging and postage. In fact the total cost of the November edition was over £1,000 less than the when I took office 5 years ago.

I have received many complimentary comments about the magazine and I thank those that have contributed to it. I hope that you enjoy reading it and to those that never read it I challenge you to remove the wrapper and see just how much it has changed.

The Newsletter

As a raw recruit to the Comms committee I volunteered to produce an experimental on-line newsletter. Issue 1 was distributed in November 2009 and there has been an edition virtually every month since. Newsletter No 73 will have been produced just before the AGM (and that does not include some AGM Conference specials). A monthly communication has given us the chance to keep you, the members, far more up-to-date with future and past events, whilst freeing up space in the magazine for lengthier articles.

Whilst on-line communications are definitely the future there is still a need for a physical publication as this provides the history of the organisation and many still prefer a paper document, even if only for reading in the smallest room in the house.
