FOND MEMORIES OF NOBBY STILES

 FORMER MANCHESTER UNITES, PRESTON NORTH END AND ENGLAND FOOTBALLER/ MANAGER – BY AMANDA HASSELL





My father, Chris Hassell was a Sports Administrator for many years and was working in football whilst I was growing up. He and my mum were lucky enough to have tickets for the 1966 World Cup at Wembley – a day they will always remember. Dad recently reminded me of an incident he remembers fondly involving Nobby Stiles who recently passed away.

Chris says "I had the pleasure and privilege of working with Nobby during my time as Secretary of Preston North End FC. Nobby was the Head Coach, with Harry Catterick as Manager, Tom Finney as President and Mark Lawrenson as a young player – this was 1975-78 and I have very fond memories of my time at Deepdale. When I moved on (as Secretary of Lancashire CCC), Nobby organised the players to carry me into the dressing room where I was unceremoniously dumped into the bath fully clothed – only 4 ft deep though – as a fond farewell. I obviously needed a tracksuit to go home in following my dousing and Nobby lent me his – being of similar stature.

Nobby was signed for North End along with David Sadler and Francis Burns from Man Utd by Bobby Charlton who was manager at that time. He played for two seasons and then took over as first team coach and later as Manager.

A memory I thought I might share with you of a great character who will be long remembered."



I thought this might be of interest. I was in Maghull RT and Nobby was a speaker for us way back before after dinner speakers became the theme.

BLAST FROM THE PAST BY RUSS DUMBILL CHAIRMAN 1983-84 ELLESMERE PORT ROUND TABLE 490

Of all the campsites in all the world....In early July 1982 after two days on the road we'd finally arrived in St Maxime on the south coast of France for a family holiday under canvas. Having selected a suitable pitch, I began the process of untangling guy ropes & tentpoles when I became aware of a fellow camper striding purposefully towards me.

"Michael Peckover, B'arlick Round Table!" he announced in a broad Yorkshire accent. "Which Table are you in?" he added, pointing to my RTBI car sticker. "Ellesmere Port 490" I replied, And there, thanks to one small circle of plastic on my car windscreen, 'midst the Mediterranean pines some 1100 miles from home, two strangers shook hands and a new friendship was instantly fostered.

By a strange twist of fate, I had recently been elected vice chairman of Ellesmere Port Round Table and Michael inducted as the current chairman of Barnoldswick & Earby Round Table (BERT). We compared notes and at the end of the holiday he invited us to pay them a family visit during which I would be a guest at their main Round Table fund raising event, 'A Gentlemen's Sporting Evening'.

What a splendid weekend it turned out to be, one in which I got to meet most of his fellow members and enjoy excellent hospitality in the outstanding natural beauty of the Yorkshire Dales. As a consequence, I came away with the seeds of an idea that would lead to Ellesmere Port's largest single fund raising event of the 20th century, after learning that this one-off event had raised

in excess of £2000.00 for local charity.

I mooted the idea of staging such an event at the next meeting of EPRT. Some members were enthusiastic, some sceptical, but after healthy and lengthy discussion, the idea was agreed in principle for me to form a sub-committee and report back with a formal proposition at our next Table meeting. Little did I realise then just what was in store in terms of time, effort, and the ultimate rewards, but as the saying goes: 'No Pain, No Gain,'

A 'Gentlemens Sporting Evening' is centred around a formal dinner followed by several bouts of amateur boxing. Breaking new ground is always a great challenge, and this would prove no exception. Firstly, contact was made with the local Golden Star Boxing Club who enthusiastically agreed to participate. That taken care of, the next step was to agree a format, assess the numbers who might attend, and find a suitable venue able to accommodate the occasion.

The sub-committee comprised of myself, Steve Merryweather, (social and dinner secretary), Alan Wood and Ken Jones, (joint community service conveners). We shortlisted three venues, The Civic Hall, The Ellesmere Port Indoor Centre and The Woodhey Hotel, where we hosted well attended Charter dinners, but quickly dismissed the latter due to restricted space, for although it had a large dance floor, an amateur boxing ring alone measures some 20ft square plus a further 6ft space separating the ringside tables. Whilst the Civic Hall was large enough, and by far the plusher, after much deliberation we decided, after site visits, the newly extended Ellesmere Port Indoor Centre (EPIC) met all of our criteria. Furthermore, they agreed for us to set up and run our own bar, courtesy of Eamon Connolly, Travellers Rest licensee, who had kindly volunteered to donate the net bar profits to our cause.

Michael Peckover, B'arlick RT!

Warrington Brewers, Tetley Walker agreed to sponsor a glossy presentation programme and further donated an 18-gallon barrel of beer to sell on the night. Rotarian Malcolm Crossland, editor of the Ellesmere Port Pioneer not only sponsored a table for twelve but provided endless free publicity for the show. Numerous local companies provided additional sponsorship by way of business card size advertisements in our Programme. Tables of ten to twelve were offered to local businesses at a cost of £120 and by the time we presented our plans to the next Table meeting, we had already received a terrific response and several advance payments.

Meetings were set up with a number of outside catering companies prior to appointing John Williamson of Chester who offered an excellent, budget friendly package with four or five course formal dinner options, Childwall Table and Chair hire, Athena Catering Hire of Middlewich (tableware and glassware) and Chester Laundry Services (Linen tablecloths and napkins). Next, we approached Mrs Butler's eldest son, Billy to be Master of Ceremonies, comedian Vince Earl for mid-session light entertainment and International footballers Brian Hamilton and David Johnson along with Olympic boxer George Gilbody to present trophies to the participating young boxers, all in the presence of Lee Stallman (Chairman of RTBI Area 36), the Mayor of Ellesmere Port and Presidents of both the Ellesmere Port Rotary and Ellesmere Lions.



The event was a huge success. From the start, all ran like clockwork, with one minor glitch occurring at around

9pm when Eamon advised we had underestimated demand for beer and were close to drinking the bar dry. Fortunately, the company van was outside, and I was sober enough to make a quick trip Little Sutton and pick up a few more barrels.

Then finally, just after midnight it was all over and after some eight months of planning, plodding and pleading, all that was left was to clean up the hall and begin counting the proceeds. In cases like this it's hard to single out one individual for praise, but I think without Steve Merryweather the task would certainly been more of a challenge. Back then, we had no mobile phones or laptops, but Steve's employers, Hewlett Packard kindly loaned us a state-of-the-art 3000 Series computer with inkjet printer.

At the end one particularly stressful day, the pair of us began feeding information into the machine well into the early hours of the morning which was strangely therapeutic, particularly once the printer finally spewing out a beautifully detailed and scaled multicolour seating plan.



I decided to go for the arrangements we used for our October meeting which I suggested and worked quite well.


I booked two tables of six at two separate restaurants in town and took names of those who wanted to attend.



Whisky Corner'

Whisky appears to be a mysterious drink to many, full of myths and romantic tales. Hearing talk of peat, smoke, caramel sweetness, citrus notes, vanilla and many other terms seems slightly weird to some when they their view is that it's just spicy alcohol.

I've always associated tasting whisky with the same principles as Round Table and 41 Club - by its very nature whisky is a social drink, which brings people together and can be shared amongst friends.


Just like the Clubs within our Association whisky can be found in different shapes, sizes, tastes and colours - and whilst having often unique backgrounds, local tales and folklores, each distillery and the whisky it produces share the same common objective of trying to ensure life is savoured and appreciated whenever possible.

Oh, and like Club meetings it's also often the reason why we return home late after an evening of fellowship!

Members who like whisky will have their own preferences for the 'water of life' and will likely buy familiar whiskies from known distilleries that they have always enjoyed. Nothing wrong with at all but with around 130 Malt and Grain whisky distilleries in Scotland alone, it would be churlish not to taste something different occasionally - wouldn't it?

In this and future articles I'll suggest some whiskies that I have tasted and you may like to try. As the saying goes "There's no such thing as a bad whisky, some happen to be better than others".

In Scotland, the six whisky regions produce different styles of whiskies but the region that generates the most 'marmite' emotions (you either love it or loath it) and happens to be my own favourite, is the island of Islay off the West of Scotland where there are nine distilleries on its tiny island (see map). Most of whose whiskies are peaty or smoky in their aroma and taste - but not all of them!







Kilchoman Loch Gorm (NAS = no age statement) -46% ABV (\sim £67)



Pronounced 'kil-ho-man' this distillery is only 14 years old, was the first new Islay distillery for 124 years and is one of the smallest distilleries in Scotland. It's a small 'farm distillery' with all of the barley grown on the farm, the adjacent stream provides the source water and local peat is used for drying the

This bottling is a vatting of 19 Oloroso Sherry Butts from three vintages (years) – 2007, 2008, 2011

Nose: Orange peel, cloves, caramel, mixed spice with waves of fruit cake and citrus

Palate: A balance of spicy richness, cooked fruits, chocolate with layers of brown sugar sweetness and

earthy peat smoke

Finish: Mouth-filling peat smoke, lasting tropical sweetness, toffee and rich dried fruit

Bunnahabhain 12 yo - 46.3 % ABV (~£40)

Pronounced 'Boon-a-havn' ('mouth of the the distillery stands at the mouth of the Margadale River on the shores of the Sound of Islay. The only distillery on the island to use the river's pure, spring water and their water is not by the abundance of peat found throughout the Islay landscape. This pure, non-peated water towards its the light taste.

This whisky has been matured for a minimum of 12 years in a combination of sherry, bourbon re-fill casks that were selected to achieve a lovely balance of the characteristic nutty and sherry

Nose: Fresh and aromatic, fruity floral with hints of dried fruit and a subtle prevalence of Palate: Light with fruit notes, nutty flavours with a sweetness and slight hints of vanilla and Finish: Lingering, beautifully rich and full-bodied.

Bruichladdich Laddie Classic (NAS) – 50% ABV (~£43)



Pronounced 'Brew-ich-laddie'. Their distillation stills slow and relatively uncommercial trickle, they won't be

this helps them create the purest spirit. The original Victorian machinery has allowed an unparalleled legacy of craft distilling to trickle down through the generations of men who make this sophisticated Islay dram.

Selected casks used for this <u>unpeated</u> whisky showcase the classic, floral and elegant Bruichladdich house style. Made from 100% Scottish barley, trickle distilled, then matured by the shores of Loch Indaal in premium American oak casks.

The particular bottle I tasted came from a vatting of 83 casks, from 4 vintages (years) and 2 barley types in 8 different cask types! Complex stuff!

Nose: Barley sugar and a hint of mint, then notes of freshly cut wildflowers with a hint of sea spray, not surprising

Palate: A mix of creaminess on an Atlantic breeze, with a combination of ripe green fruit and brown sugar.

If you fancy trying some of these or other whiskies I can recommend a couple of excellent whisky websites:


John has now moved the charity giving to his main website, so rather than just those who were made aware of the charity giving shop, now everyone who buys books is being asked to choose one of the charities.


have already purchased books and supported me on my journey, and of course, supported the charities.
