On the business side of the Association, we had an excellent National Council meeting in July and the main topics of discussion are highlighted below:

- 41 Action Plan good progress is being made on our actions particularly around membership with a number of new XRT (xtra round table) clubs having been established.
- Budget- the revised budget for 2024 was accepted and is available for any member to view on line. Whilst the increase in capitation has been a talking point since Jersey, I hope that my email to all members and the National Secretary's email to club contacts satisfactory addresses how the proposal came about from the floor and whilst some members may be unhappy with the vote, I am sure you will all agree that the democratic process was followed.
- Conference 2024- it was pleasing to hear that Liverpool is a sell-out.
- IT we are reviewing the number of licences for office 365 with a view to decreasing our costs.
- Insurance a panel of 3 experts have been tasked to review our current policy to see if it meets our needs both nationally and locally and I am hopeful that by the time we meet as a National Council in Stranraer we will have a firm idea of what our new insurance policy needs to cover. The expectation is that new policy will be far more beneficial in covering most locally organised events thereby giving added benefits to our members.

- GDPR we have agreed a new policy.
- Fellowship- it was pleasing to report that 2 new interest Facebook groups have been set up, gardening and fishing.
- Governance a task and finish group has been established to review our structure at both a Board and Regional level.

One of my key aims as President is to engage as widely as I can with members and accordingly am asking clubs if I can attend either a meeting or social event. With over 650 clubs and trying to balance work I am not going to be able to visit every club but if you would like me to visit, please do not hesitate to drop me a line. The warm welcome and excellent fellowship that I receive when I visit never ceases to amaze me and I am so proud to be your National President.

As part of my charity fundraising, I have teamed up with Penderyn Whisky and when I visit clubs there is an opportunity to purchase a bottle or 2 of which 21% goes towards my charity. My first months as IRO have passed in a whirlwind getting to grips with the 41-club international scene, making travel arrangements and asking myself how I can bring best practice back from the international AGM's I attend.



I have also been dealing with very panicked IROs when they've realised Liverpool is sold out as well as acting as a personal travel agent to several delegates at Stratford who undertook their own pre and post tours in around Edinburgh. This included home hosting past International 41 club President Bruce McKay and his wife Tania on their way to Stratford.

My first AGM in Denmark was a good starter as I met my fellow IROs and was introduced to some weird Danish food and drinks as well as the added bonus of seeing some very highly restored American classic cars.

Onto Stratford and what a weekend that was. I cannot praise the organising committee highly enough for the event they pulled off, this has been reflected in a considerable number of thank you emails to the team for their efforts from international delegates. The agm brought home what an honour it is to be part of the international 41 club scene. 



Ashby 41 Club

A chance conversation during a volunteering session at a local country park led to an Ashby 41 Club member arranging a meeting with a difference for the club during August. Apparently, during a recent classic car show at nearby Castle Donington, somebody had turned up with a CVRT Sabre light tank, driving it from his home to the event! Hmm...I wonder...

Contact was made with James the tank owner, who kindly agreed to bring his tank along for the evening, give club members a brief talk about why he has a tank, followed of course by rides for all who wanted them. James lived too far away from Ashby to drive the tank all the way. Fortunately, Wayne, who had arranged the classic car show and has good local contacts, was able to gain permission for us to use the car park of the local Community Centre - provided he was there to keep an eye on us all! Massive thanks to Wayne.

We were blessed with good weather for the evening. James gave us a good talk on his 'hobby', and told us that he also used to have a 10-people personnel carrier, but that has been moved on to Ukraine to help their war effort. The situation there is also making spare parts difficult to obtain for the tank, as Latvia still has some 120 of these units and those spare parts are being bought up.

Whilst the fuel consumption of the Jaquar petrol engine isn't brilliant at around 4mpg, the biggest concern on expenditure is the tracks, which used to be around £15,000, but have now increased significantly in price due to difficulties in sourcing. Fortunately, James has one spare set at the moment!

It is possible that this tank saw service in the Falklands back in 1982, but James has been unable to confirm this, due to missing records. A photo does exist from that time which confirms all but the last two characters on the number plate, so there is a chance.

Those that wanted a ride then enjoyed a couple of circuits each of the car park. We then adjourned to a local pub. James was unable to join us for that, but we have a good video of him heading off down the main street in Castle Donington!

We had a good turnout from our 41 Club, and the photo shows our complete group (minus the photographer), plus a couple of Ashby Tablers who sneaked in to join us.

A huge thank you to James. We're sure he would like it to be known that the tank is available to hire for weddings, proms, etc. - now that would be different.



We were delighted to hand over a cheque for £5,600 to Maggie's Forth Valley, taking the total raised for good causes since 2017 to an incredible £75.066.

My National Membership role continues to be all-embracing and since assuming the role I have engaged on a one-to-one basis with over 140 Clubs and individuals, including 22 enquiries regarding XRT Clubs and many enquiries from new members who were not Tablers wanting to join.

## **Membership Numbers**

The number of unique 41 Club Members across the Association has fallen slightly over the past quarter. Whilst any reduction is unwelcome of course, the trend is slowing despite some Clubs having to address the twin challenges of aging member profiles and the long-term cautious response of post lockdown.



### **New Club Affiliations**

The good news however is that the effort in raising awareness of the new XRT Club concept since April this year when we launched the new XRT concept to RTBI is starting to gain traction and it is very encouraging that In the past three months three new XRT Clubs have requested to be affiliated at the forthcoming National Council meeting in October – all with the support of their existing 41 Clubs.



### Lancaster & Morecambe XRT

In Lancaster & Morecambe XRT in Region 5 North West - some of the joiners have also been members of the existing Lancaster 41 Club but where there is a large age gap with older members. Consequently, a new XRT has been formed, with the existing 41 Club supportive of the new Club being affiliated.



#### Ellesmere Port XRT

At Ellesmere Port XRT in Region 11, Cheshire & NW Midlands – again, the existing 41 Club has an older-age profile and are supportive of the new Club being formed from Tablers who are leaving/have left Ellesmere Port RT who wanted to continue doing Tabling activities.



## Melton Mowbray 41 Club

Finally, at Melton Mowbray 41 Club in Region 15 Heart of England - the existing club and its members had decided to disaffiliate due to an older age and reducing members. Those Tablers leaving Melton Mowbray RT however wanted to continue their tabling activities by forming a new XRT club. When they heard about the 41 Club disaffiliating though, they decided to 'adopt' the Melton Mowbray 41 Club name rather than form a new XRT Club. Thus a 'new' Club has now been established and a handover meeting of the Chairman's jewel has been arranged for November.

The above are great examples of how new XRT Clubs are working with existing 41 Clubs to increase and maintain members who may have left the Round Table Family. There are more XRT Clubs in the pipeline – watch this space!

## Does your Club welcome Invitational Members?

As you may recall, at the Cardiff AGM in 2022 we relaxed the criteria for men joining 41 Club, with them no longer having to previously have been in Round Table. It was for each Club however to decide whether to accept such 'invitational members.' Since then, I have received several enquiries from prospective members who want to join 41 Club but were not in Table. Currently, I cannot direct them to a local 41 Club unless I know it will welcome non-ex-Tablers. This causes delay and can be potentially embarrassing.

To address this therefore, I will be contacting all Clubs in October to advise them that it will be assumed that they are happy to welcome non-ex Tablers members unless they advise National Council to the contrary by 1st December 2023. The decision whether to accept will still be taken at Club level and is not mandatory.

## My granddaughter Sophie Shipway and myself completed our Velocity 2 Zip Wire challenge at Penrhyn Quarry, Snowdonia on the 16th September.

We were blessed with a sunny day and after parking up in the free car park, that was almost full, we approached the reception desk to receive our wrist bands that would have our weight written upon it. We checked in at 13.40 to be given a harness for which we were strapped in, a helmet and a video camera affixed to our helmets. A short walk to our first ride of 30 seconds at 30mph to give us a feeling of what we were about to encounter on the Velocity ride.



Now 30mph doesn't sound very fast, but when you are hanging in a hammock like harness, face down looking forward it is a bit daunting. When we were all ready to go, safety measures checked and re checked the staff would then call one two three in Welsh and release us. Note two in Welsh is Die! Having survived our first short zip ride we were then led to a very old rusty lorry to transport us to the top of the 700 foot guarry. This slow

twisting jolting journey lasted about 15 minutes.



A party pop band formed 34 years ago for a one-off Round Table charity gig has gone on to play more than 200 times and help raise thousands of pounds for good causes.



But they have now taken their final bow at a farewell concert back at the venue where it all began near Diss in Norfolk.

QED were born in 1989 when three members of the local Round Table friendship and fundraising club provided the backbone for the groupJournalist Richard Batson, bank manager Colin Start and vet Graham Dick played guitar, bass and keyboards and were joined by friends and family for the first ever gig at Palgrave Community Centre.

All three, now retired, were back there for the final concert, hosted by Phil Catchpole who was Table chairman at the first one, and which raised around £400 for Parkinson's Disease.

Richard said: "Colin and I used to do skit songs at Table events as an acoustic duo, then Graham piped up he played keys and suggested 'Let's form a band' - a bit like in those old Mickey Rooney movies.



"The first gig was exciting and terrifying in equal measure for those of us who were previously just front room performers. But it went down well and things just took off. We were doing a gig a month at one stage, mostly at community and fundraising events, including other Round Tables. "We mainly 'toured' in East Anglia, but also had gigs as far away as London, Sussex and Hampshire."

There have been line-up changes over the years but Richard, Colin and his wife Karen have been constants. Graham now living near Newbury in Hampshire joined the final gig line-up having last played with the band on Millenium night.

Richard added: "It is sad to call it a day as we have had some great times, and formed great friendships, but none of us is getting any younger and were just about coming to a natural end when the idea of the Palgrave gig came up - which seemed the perfect way to sign off.

Richard remains a member of Sheringham and Cromer 41 Club.

In 1972 Nick Dales, a 41 Club member and former member of Surbiton Round Table, put an advert in the Tabler and 41 Club magazines "Calling all Bikers".



It produced a large number of motorcyclists from Tables and 41 clubs all over the Country, and with the assistance of Peter Thornton of Kendal Round Table, Nick put together a stunning weekend based at Brockwood Hall with a route including Hard Knott Pass and along Wastwater.

Above is a photo taken at the front door of Brockwood Hall that weekend back in 1972. Nick is fourth from the left.

From there, Table Bikers went from strength to strength and Nick arranged trips to Europe, which were the first trips abroad by motorbike that many of us had made, and which sowed the seed for many of us to continue continental touring, and beyond.

The club brought many people together who then rode together on a regular basis. In other words, he enriched the lives of a lot of Tablers and 41ers.

The club is still active with a number of meetings per year and trips abroad. A number of Table bikers have attended the 41 Club biking weekends, the overwhelming number of members of Table Bikers being 41ers.

Over the years Nick found that he was unable to continue with the club, but his wife, Winnie, who was an enthusiastic member along with their son James, tells me that he still lived a life of adventure.

My abiding memory is of him cutting it fine at ferry ports. He said his ambition was to waste a total of no more than 30 minutes waiting for a ferry in his whole life!!



Nick died on the 10th June this year after a lengthy period of illness.

He was a gentleman, a man with vision, and he enriched the lives of so many of us, plenty of whom are still enjoying the benefits.

"Yes! I can do that" I said when the National Fellowship Officer, Kelly Clarke asked me at the Kings Lynn Motorcycle Weekend last year, if I would be prepared to organise the next 2023 event on or about 14th July.

I had attended the previous two weekends, Hinkley and Kings Lynn and had been riding weekends away with the Northern Region Table Bikers and 41 group, since I was in Bolton Round Table in the early 90's, and then Area 46/41 Club, so the opportunity to show the delights of the Derbyshire Peak District where I had retired to some 6 years earlier was a great opportunity not to be missed.

Mark Goulden from Spalding and District 41 Club immediately said he would help me and so the event was born.

One of the main challenges was finding a large enough hotel in the area, that is primarily a visitor destination, that would and could be flexible enough to block book possibly up to 40 rooms in the middle of July.

The Holiday Inn at South Normanton adjacent to junction 28 on the M1 seemed the ideal location and a visit was made.

Ideal! Plenty of rooms, leisure facilities, greatcarparking and spacious socialising areas in addition to the possible use of a conference room for group dining and were happy to negotiate a Dinner Bed and Breakfast rate.

The only issue now was getting Kelly to agree to our choice, but that was no

problem. 40 rooms were duly reserved for either double or single occupancy D B &B.

I already had an idea of a 150 mile ride out, taking in country houses, iconic motorcycle routes and picturesque towns and villages rather than a ride out to a destination as had previously been arranged so out came a map and a yellow marker pen.

By this time Mark was on the case of designing printed T shirts and looking for sponsorship for items to fill the customary Goody Bags.

By Christmas, I had produced a draught multi page guide and route map.

From the beginning of January, booking through 41 Club events opened and it was now a waiting game.

In the spring of 2023, my son Richard, Mark and myself rode my proposed route to check mileages, timings and refreshment stops etc.

By April we had 18 booked in with a further 3 by the middle of June.

All we needed now was fine weather, not too hot to make riding uncomfortable but not rain.

Friday 14th July arrived - Rain - and hard in places.

I was standing at our event check in desk with a mop and bucket in hand cleaning up the pools of water our intrepid riders were bringing into the hotel, much to the amusement of the hotel receptionists.

A few cups of tea and a few beers later, we all sat down to dinner accompanied by our National President Steve James and his wife Karen who also had endured atrocious driving conditions to be with us that evening.

An esteemed member of the group, Norman Hyde, holder of a motorcycle with sidecar speed record in 1972 was signing photographs for sale with the proceeds being donated to Steve's Prostate Cancer Research nominated charity that raised £70 that night.

Saturday morning started out fine with spells of sunshine and 19 motorcycles set off at 09.30am heading towards Matlock Bath like a long snake slithering along the tarmac.

Passing through Matlock Bath, a popular motorcyclist destination and tourist town quickly brought us into Matlock itself and on to passing Chatsworth House to our right and on towards Hathersage and the lower stretches of the Ladybower reservoir system to the visitor centre where a well deserved hot drink and toilets awaited.



75 years ago, this area was the practice training ground for the bouncing bomb pilots in the 2nd World War.

The snake pass, Britain's most dangerous and iconic motorcycle road was safely negotiated and after descending into Glossop, made our way over to Chapel en le Frith, home of the Ferodo brake lining company.

The Goyt Valley just north of Whaley Bridge is a lovely single track road just past the main car parks and reservoir and up to the former Cat and Fiddle pub to another iconic motorcycle road, the A537 down to Macclesfield was where we stopped for lunch.

The rain held off and Leek was passed through riding up onto the Staffordshire Moorlands, past the climbers paradise of the Roaches rocky outcrop and right towards Longnor, the quaint village of Monyash and on and down into Bakewell.

A short ride later past Haddon Hall saw us back into Matlock where the sun shone, drying out our wet clothing.

We were soon back at South Normanton after our 150 mile round trip and our hotel was a welcome sight.

Vice President Wynn Parry joined us for dinner where £125 was raised towards



My wife Elizabeth for all her support and understanding this past year whilst time was being spent planning and preparing on the computer and finally, Kelly Clarke, National Fellowship Officer for all his support and encouragement.





## Fun, Friendship and many, many Footsteps

## Thursday - Day One

Stephen and Karen eventually arrived at 13:30. Quick change, photo shoot and then we headed off just before 14:00.

Fifteen walkers set off from the Merton Hotel in St. Helier, a combination of Round the Island Walkers and Social Walkers. We headed down to the seafront and followed the coastal path west, around the headland, past the marina and off

towards St. Aubin. The tide was out exposing the expanse of beach. Some took the opportunity to walk on the beach while the rest followed the promenade around the bay.

We reached St. Aubin and the group split into two. The Social Walkers decided to call it a day and headed to various bars and cafe's for a well earned coffee or something stronger.

Distance walked 9 miles, Time taken 2 Hours 38 minutes, Distance to go 35 miles

## Sunday - Day Two

Our second leg started on Sunday, and we were joined by four additional walkers (Karen James, Andy Ventress and David and Karen Bentley). David was ready and waiting with his minibus and drove us back to Corbiere Point to continue where we left off.

We followed a footpath around the headland and then down to the beach. Again we were lucky with the tides and walked across the beach at St Ouens Bay; in what can only be described as a gale,

thankfully the sun was shining. A few Kite Borders were enjoying the conditions as we walked along the four mile length of beach. At the end of the beach, David and Karen left us to explore and make their own way back. We left the beach and started to climb up the north-west headland toward Grozney Castle. The path took us past a number of World War II German bunkers and gun emplacements and around Jersey race course.


The path continued to follow the coast, with steep climbs and descents. We eventually reached La Greve de Lecq on the north west coast. Where we stopped to take a quick breather and rest for 5mins.

A steep climb up from La Greve de Lecq soon brought us back to the coastal path. Here we turned east following the contours of the north coast clifftop footpath to the Devil's Hole, just north of Saint Mary's. David was waiting for us and was a much welcomed sight after another long walk. With 21 miles completed, we were just under halfway round the island.

Distance walked 21 miles, Time taken 7 Hours 6 minutes, Distance to go 23 miles

## Monday - Day Three

The third and final day started with a very early breakfast, with five of us meeting at 7:30. Not surprisingly we had the breakfast room to ourselves. At 8:30 David was waiting in reception and the five of us, Stephen & Karen James, Paul, Hampton, and Jerry & Julia Wilson, piled into the back



of of the mini van to head out for the final leg of the walk. David dropped us off at Devils Hole and we started walking.



We rejoined the costal path where we had left off the previous day in glorious sunshine, albeit it was quite fresh and cold in the shade. The path continued to hug the coast and involved a lot of up climbing and descending the various valleys that were around the coast; which did nothing for our aching legs and knees. It was slow going not helped by the fact that we knew we had about 14 miles of this terrain to complete before reaching level ground at Gorey on the West Coast.

We descended to Rozel for a much needed lunch stop on the pier at the Hungry Man fast food van. Revived by a short break and some much needed sustenance the group continued on the route with the last major climb out of Rozel and on to the

headland. The path followed a couple of green lanes and then dropped back down to the coast.

We followed the coast path, which was now relatively flat to St. Catherines Breakwater. The group enjoyed a quick stop for ice creams and to take a look at the Sand Wizard's latest sand sculpture.

We continued around the bay, following the road and climbing to Gorey castle. As we descended from Gorey Castle to the harbour, we were welcomed by a large group of 41 Club / Tangent wellwishers who had been waiting for us to arrive for several hours (much of which was spent in the local bar). It was a great boost to see so many welcoming faces.

The group now grew in size as many of the Social Walkers decided to join us for the last 7 miles back to St. Helier. The last section was a relatively flat slog around the coast. The path seemed to go on for ever until we came round the corner and could see the finish line across the bay.

We headed back to the beach and regrouped to finish the walk together and pose for a final photograph. Having competed the walk we headed to the White Horse pub for a celebratory meal and a few well earned pints.

Distance walked 44 miles, Time taken = 16 Hours

We completed a hard walk, walking 44 miles in about 2 days. It was hard, also

great fun and very rewarding. The group was helped by 41 Club and Tangent members.






